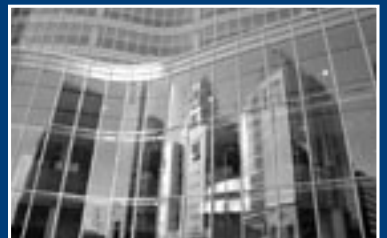

# General Information

## Conference description and goals

Applied nursing care models, in their evolution from caring theory to nursing practice, potentially vary according to regional nursing culture and vernacular interpretation of nursing care delivery systems. This conference will explore and compare current and emerging applied nursing care models by addressing the following sub-themes:

- The ability of nurses to recognize and describe current or emerging models of nursing care in their practice, education, and research settings.
- Health outcomes of patient and family exposure to nursing care models.
- A nursing profession definition and evaluation of applied nursing care models.
- The economic impact of nursing care models on healthcare delivery.

## Keynote speakers



**Anne Boykin, PhD, RN**, is dean and professor, Christine E. Lynn College of Nursing, Florida Atlantic University. Previously, she held various faculty and administrative roles at Marquette University, Milwaukee, Wisconsin; Clemson University, Clemson, South Carolina; and Valdosta State College, Valdosta, Georgia. Boykin lives her commitment to nursing through administration, research, teaching, and service, and is recognized internationally and nationally for her scholarship on caring. She has co-authored and edited several books including *Nursing as Caring: A Model for Transforming Practice* and *Living a Caring Based Program*. She has also authored numerous book chapters and articles focused on caring, spirituality, nursing as a discipline, and story as method for the study of nursing. Boykin is past president of the International Association for Human Caring, a member of several local boards, and actively involved in nursing at the international, national, state, and local levels.



**Janet F. Quinn, PhD, RN, FAAN**, is associate professor (adjunct) at the University of Colorado School of Nursing. She holds a PhD in nursing research and theory development from New York University. Her research on therapeutic touch has been funded by the United States Department of Health and Human Services and by the Institute of Noetic Sciences. She has served as a peer reviewer for research grants at the National Institutes of Health National Center for Complementary and Alternative Medicine. Quinn writes, lectures, and consults internationally on re-visioning the nursing shortage, creating “habitats for healing,” integrative medicine/nursing, care for the caregiver, healing, caring, spirituality and healing, and healthcare as a spiritual practice. She was founding faculty and spiritual director in residence for the former Claritas Institute Interspiritual Mentor Training Program; is an interspiritual guide in private practice, and developed and teaches the Touching Body, Tending Soul™ Program for health and healing practitioners. Quinn is also the author of a book of affirmations and meditations for women entitled *I am a Woman Finding My Voice*, and president of Wisdom Stones, LLC, which produces and markets touchstones to what matters most.



**Pamela O. Johnson, MS, RN**, Vice-Chair, Department of Nursing, Mayo Clinic, Rochester, Minnesota, joined Mayo Clinic in 1980 as a staff RN at Rochester Methodist Hospital. In her 30 year nursing career, she has held positions as a staff RN, nurse manager, discharge planning coordinator, and nurse administrator. Johnson graduated from the College of St. Catherine in St. Paul, Minnesota and holds a master of science in nursing degree from the University of Minnesota - Minneapolis. In the vice-chair role, Johnson has overall responsibility for clinical nursing across both the inpatient and ambulatory practices, which includes over 6,000 nurses. She participates on several institutional and departmental committees and is a member of multiple professional nursing organizations.
